Spain's leading nature tourism fair turns 20

The Extremadura Birdwatching Fair (FIO) celebrates its twentieth anniversary from 21 to 23 February in Villarreal de San Carlos (Serradilla), in the heart of the Monfragüe National Park and Biosphere Reserve. Over these twenty years, it has become the top meeting point for nature-related tourism and bird watching in Spain. It is the leading fair in its sector in our country and the second most important in Europe.

For three days, this event, organised by the Regional Government of Extremadura (Junta de Extremadura), brings together the best of this growing tourist activity: destinations, accommodation, guides, manufacturers and distributors of photography and optics, conservation associations, specialist shops, nature artists... In total, 114 exhibitors, a record that exceeds the best figure previously reached (111 in 2024).



FIO has prepared a wide programme of activities to commemorate its 20th edition: lectures and discussions, workshops for adults and children, book and project presentations, exhibitions, guided tours, birding in different places in the National Park and entertainment shows.

Added to this are the B2B Professional Meetings for national and international nature tourism companies (the most important such event for the sector in Spain).

All of this in Monfragüe, one of the world's meccas for bird watching.

FIO is part of the strategy of the Junta de Extremadura to position our Autonomous Community as a destination for bird tourism, an activity that is sustainable, accessible to all and that can be practiced in the countryside and the city. Other initiatives are part of this objective, such as the 15th Cáceres Bird Festival, which will take place on 25 and 26 April 2025, the Crane Festival and the Birding in Extremadura Club, a voluntary group in which 170 members, including companies and public entities, collaborate to promote the sector and guarantee quality customer service.





The meeting point for professionals in the sector

One of the aspects that differentiates FIO from other similar fairs is its professional element. This year, more than 110 exhibitors from fourteen Autonomous Communities and six countries will meet to present their products, from bird watching tours in Spain and abroad to cameras, books and works of art.

Without a doubt, one of the strong points of the fair is its Professional Meetings. On the first day (21 February) dozens of buyers and sellers will meet to make contacts and generate business opportunities. This initiative is the only one organised in Spain in the nature tourism and bird watching sector.

Furthermore, Extremadura Tourist Board organises two familiarisation trips for national and international agents and tour operators, who will participate in the business day and also visit Extremadura to see for themselves what the region has to offer.

Extremaduran talent in a programme with great national and international experts From 21 to 23 February, there will be talks about ornithology, conservation projects, environmental education, sustainable tourism, nature photography and cinema, art, communication...

The programme of lectures and specialised workshops features renowned experts in different fields, such as Alejandra Rendón (Colombia), Andrew Sebastian (Malaysia), Antonio Sandoval, Alfonso Godino, Carlos de Hita, Herbert Byaruhanga (Uganda), Horacio Matarasso (Argentina), Ian Lewington (United Kingdom), José Antonio Sencianes, Laura Núñez, Laurie J. Goodrich (USA), Lourdes Berzas, Luisa Abenza, Nacho Sevilla and Victor Yu (Taiwan), among others.

Extremadura is represented in the 20th FIO by specialists in various fields, from environmental protection to photography and illustration, such as Ana Fernández, Ángel Rodríguez, Ernesto Montoya, Jaime Culebras, Jesús Mateos Martín, Juan Pablo Prieto, Marcelino Cardalliaguet, María Madruga, Merce R. Romero, Pepe Antolín and Sonia Chivo.

In addition, three Extremadurans have won different categories in the FIO photography competition: Joaquín Figueredo ('Birds in action'), José-Elías Rodríguez ('Nature videos') and Héctor Cordero (Special Prize for Extremaduran Photographers).

Opening ceremony

The opening ceremony of FIO 2025 will be held on Friday 21 February, attended by the Regional Minister of Culture, Tourism, Youth and Sports, Victoria Bazaga.

Travel agents from Spain and ten other countries visit Extremadura

In the days leading up to FIO, before participating in the Professional Meetings on 21 February, a group of 17 national travel agents and tour operators and another 14 from overseas will visit Extremadura to learn about what is on offer related to nature and birdwatching. Among the





foreign companies, there are representatives from Belgium, the United States, France, India, Italy, Lithuania, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, Sri Lanka and Switzerland.

B2B Professional Meetings



It will take place on February 21 in the FOTOFIO marquee from 09.00 to 14.30.

Its objective is to promote business opportunities for companies that offer specialized services in birdwatching and nature tourism.

The dynamic consists of 15-minute meetings previously arranged. Access as a seller is limited to members of the Birding in Extremadura Club, incoming travel agencies in Extremadura and FIO exhibitors.

The list of confirmed buyers includes 31 agents and tour operators who will participate in the two familiarization trips. There are 17 national participants from communities such as Madrid, Catalonia and Galicia, and 14 international participants from the countries mentioned in the previous section.

Between 550 and 600 meetings are planned for the morning of the 21st.

Serradilla Town Council presents a new and spectacular viewpoint that adds to the town's tourist infrastructure and to the list of essential places to visit in Monfragüe. The municipality hosting FIO has become a top destination for nature tourism in Extremadura in recent years.



17:00-17:30. 'Impact of waste disposal in natural environments' by Miguel Muñoz Carmona

In the English-speaking world, especially in the academia, the term 'littering' is well-known. The impact of litter in nature has attracted the attention of various research groups. In this talk, aimed at the general public, the results of the main published scientific studies will be presented, which show the environmental impact of litter on both wildlife, especially birds, and the environment.

17:30-18:00. 'The work of the natural environment agents of the Government of Extremadura for bird conservation' by Juan Pablo Prieto Clemente, Sonia Chivo and María Madruga. Professional Association of Natural Environment Agents of Extremadura





The natural environment agents are the only autonomous environmental police force that exists in Extremadura. In their daily work, one of their main tasks is to enhance our knowledge and conservation of bird populations.

Juan Pablo Prieto, Sonia Chivo and María Madruga, natural environment agents, will explain their role in the preparation of censuses, marking and monitoring of birds; collection and transfer of injured fauna to the recovery centre; monitoring of works and their compliance with pauses and other environmental conditions to minimise their impact in areas of reproduction and concentration of birds; controls of hunting; surveillance in protected areas; and maintenance of nest sites.

18:00-18:30. 'The Black Vulture: 30 years in the Monfragüe National Park and Biosphere Reserve' by Ángel Rodríguez, director of the Monfragüe National Park from 1990 to 2023

The Monfragüe National Park is known, above all, for the wealth of birds it hosts, especially birds of prey.

For 30 years, an annual monitoring of the reproduction of the most emblematic species of this area has been carried out, the bird with the largest wingspan in Eurasia: the Black Vulture. This species is the one most identified with the National Park, where the highest known concentration of breeding pairs in the world is found.

Ángel Rodríguez obtained the title of technical forestry engineer from the Polytechnic University of Madrid in 1984, after having spent a childhood in close contact with the nature that surrounded him, being a member of well-known conservation associations such as WWF (Adena), Adenex and SEO/BirdLife.

The result of this training and his passion for birds led him to become a forest ranger in 1985 in the then recently created Monfragüe Natural Park (which became a National Park 2007), becoming its director in 1990, a position which he held for more than 30 years, until his retirement in 2020.

18:30-19:00. 'New approaches and alliances for the conservation of agro-steppe birds: the Iberian Agrosteppes project' by Marcelino Cardalliaguet, SEO/Birdlife delegate in Extremadura

The large agro-steppe birds of the Iberian Peninsula have shown very sharp declines in recent decades, which are accelerating in the face of marked changes in the agricultural systems on which they depend. A multitude of projects around these species have focused on their conservation from traditional approaches, defined by their ecological requirements. The 'Agroestepas Ibéricas' project develops measures to conserve agricultural practices that are beneficial for these birds, financially supporting the ecosystem services they provide by maintaining traditional practices or limiting their productivity.

The World Birdfair Council, of which FIO is a member, will share the latest developments in birding tourism on the international scene, as well as the events and activities it encompasses.

Fairs and events of this type have made a great contribution to birding tourism, the conservation of wildlife and its habitats, and to raising environmental awareness among the general public. They also provide a place for tourism professionals, researchers and conservationists to network, share research results and discuss strategies for bird and nature conservation.

They offer great opportunities for field researchers to showcase their conservation efforts and for the public to appreciate the results of the hard work carried out by various sectors, the results of which have a direct impact on the economic and social activity of the regions where this birding tourism takes place.

11.30-12.15. 'Illustration in the digital age' by Ian Lewington (designer of the FIO 2025 poster)

British-born Ian Lewington will discuss the relevance of illustration in the age of digital photography and his techniques for producing artwork for field guides.

Considered one of the most influential bird artists, he is renowned for his ability to fuse scientific precision with a captivating artistic style, as demonstrated in multiple internationally renowned guides, such as 'Rare Birds of North America', produced with Steve N. G. Howell and Will Russell.

12.30-13.30. 'Hawk Mountain, Pennsylvania (USA): Ninety Years of Raptor Conservation' by Laurie J. Goodrich, Director of Conservation Sciences, Hawk Mountain Sanctuary

Hawk Mountain, the world's first raptor sanctuary, was founded in 1934. It helped launch a movement to conserve raptors across the United States that ultimately led to their legal protection in the 1970s.

With active science and education programmes, Hawk Mountain has hosted more than 510 students from 76 countries since the 1970s and its graduates are now responsible for counting and conserving more than 12 million migrating hawks annually.

The conference will be followed by a discussion moderated by Alfonso Godino, technical coordinator of Action for the Wild World (AMUS).





13.45-14.15. 'Sound and art. The sound of the FIO posters' by Carlos de Hita

One of the distinctive features of each FIO are the posters designed by some of Europe's top nature artists. Year after year, the images of a Peregrine Falcon, Lapwings, some sandgrouse or a flock of cranes summon us to go to Monfragüe. But these animals have a voice, and live in a landscape, surrounded by other sounds. And with these landscapes, with these voices, Carlos de Hita has composed a soundtrack that pays tribute to this valued commitment to the art of nature.

16.00-16.40. 'The return of the bearded vulture in the Sierra de Gredos: a 360° project. And the latest news in Picos de Europa' by Gerardo Báguena, project director of the Foundation for the Conservation of the Bearded Vulture

After several years of preparation, LIFE Pro Quebrantahuesos has consolidated a founding nucleus of Bearded Vultures in the Sierra de Gredos, as a further step towards recovering their former distribution in the Iberian Peninsula.

Although the first reintroductions took place in 2022, preparations began years before that. It is a project with a holistic conception, in which a strong involvement of all sectors related to its conservation stands out, which makes it unique in Europe.

16.50-17.30. Presentation of the 'Guide to the Identification of the Feathers of Diurnal Birds of Prey of the Iberian Peninsula, the Balearic Islands and the Canary Islands' by Pablo Fernández Pero

Pablo Fernández Pero makes an exclusive official presentation of this guide, created by the Plumarium project and published by Tundra Ediciones. It has more than 3,000 photographs spread over more than 700 pages where you can study in great detail the extraordinary qualities of the plumage of more than 30 species.

17.40-18.10. Presentation of 'Tierra de pájaros' ('Land of Birds')

'Tierra de pájaros' ('Land of Birds') is the latest book published by Papel Continuo, a small publishing house located in Garganta la Olla, in La Vera (Extremadura), which publishes illustrated books for adults, about nature and rural life.

To present this work, Pilar López Ávila (author of the text) and Leticia Ruifernández (illustrations) prepare a performance that combines words, live painting and music. The authors read some texts to convey the adventure of how this book is made by searching for birds in different corners of Extremadura.

At certain moments, music and live painting take centre stage and we see Leticia creating watercolours that unfold at the back of the stage, hanging from a rope, accompanied by Fernanda Valdés' accordion.

For more than 20 years, the Guadiana Hydrographic Confederation has been developing environmental education projects. This conference will summarize this trajectory and the accumulated experience, while also presenting the environmental education work developed by the Tagus Hydrographic Confederation.

In addition, the book 'Guide to Hydrological Reserves of the Tagus basin' will be presented, which provides information on 36 river reserves, 3 lake reserves and 2 groundwater reserves in this basin.

10.40-11.10. Presentation of the book 'A journey to discover the nature of Spain' by Javier Gómez Aoiz

Through an amazing journey through the four seasons of the year, this book, published by Anaya Touring, provides 365 proposals to discover the nature of Spain. In this varied compilation, spread across the different regions of the country, including the Canary and Balearic archipelagos, numerous places and specific landscapes of great interest and a wide range of species of fauna and flora are described.

11.20-12.10. 'Scientific ringing in South Africa: searching for the origin of Palearctic species' by Juan Manuel Peralta, Germán López 'Melerus' and Álvaro Begines

What was initially a fun trip with friends found an unexpected component: the possibility of capturing Palearctic birds to be able to infer their populations of origin. Trans-Saharan migratory Palearctic birds reach their southern limit in South Africa and by analysing the isotopic fingerprint of the feathers of the juveniles we can infer the geographical location of the nest, i.e. the area where that individual came from.

12.20-13.10. 'Is it possible to enjoy the natural environment without compromising its conservation? Seeking balance between humans and nature' by Natalia Pleite Guzmán

It is no secret that human evolution and the development of civilizations have had a strong impact on the natural environment. However, beyond the big cities, road networks, power lines and other artificial infrastructures, it is worth asking: what mark do we leave as individuals when we simply go out into the mountains to walk, ride a bike, observe wildlife or pick mushrooms? Is it possible to enjoy the natural environment without compromising its conservation?

13.20-14.30. Closing ceremony of the 20th anniversary of FIO: 'Birders' lives' Intergenerational discussion with Joan Mayol, Carlos de Hita, Raquel Lozano, Yanina Maggiotto, David Santamaría and Antonio Sandoval (moderator)





The different experiences of those who will participate in this colloquium will provide an overview of how ornithology, birding and bird tourism have evolved over the last half century. Among the aspects to be addressed will be how birding and identification tools have changed, the options for travelling to see birds, the possibilities for recording and sharing information, the tools for dissemination and the number of people who enjoy these activities.

FOTOFIO Lectures

FIO organises talks and workshops with nature photographers who share their experiences, projects and travels with the public in an open and participatory format. Under the heading of FOTOFIO, these conferences attract photography professionals and amateurs. They also cover topics such as nature films and conservation projects.

10.20-11.00. 'Illuminated Nature' by Paco Segarra

The new high-speed photography. Light as a determining resource to create a pictorial and contemporary work. The union of natural and artificial light bringing a new interpretation of the actions of animals beyond the reach of human sight. Equipment, technique and results.

Explanatory photographs and videos make 'Illuminated Nature' a true masterclass aimed at all photographers and nature lovers in general. Photography and imagination at the service of visual beauty and conservation.



11.10-11.50. 'Megadiverse Ecuador, the tropics divided by the Andes' by Jaime Culebras

Despite its small size, Ecuador has one of the richest biological resources in the world. This is largely due to its privileged latitudinal position and the Andes Mountain range, which runs through the entire country like a backbone. This biodiversity is not exempt from danger, as Ecuador faces numerous and serious environmental impacts that threaten its nature.

Jaime Culebras is a biologist and photographer from Cáceres, focused on conservation. He has published more than 30 scientific papers, describing 11 new species of amphibians. He is a contributor to 'National Geographic', has more than 50 international photography awards and is co-star of the documentary 'Heroes' in 'Planet Earth III'.

He is a co-founder of Photo Wildlife Tours, an Ecuadorian nature tourism company, and researcher at the Fundación Cóndor Andino, an NGO for the conservation of Ecuadorian biodiversity.

12.00-12.40. 'Approaching local wildlife from a new perspective' by Mads Hagen

As a Danish nature and bird photographer, Mads Hagen dreamt of travelling to the ends of the Earth. However, through his work with photography, he realised that capturing the familiar with fresh eyes can provide equally wonderful experiences in nature.

In this talk, he will take viewers on a journey into the local wildlife that we can all see and photograph right outside our doorstep, and in this way learn to appreciate and capture the beauty of our local environment.





12.50-13.30. How 'Un año de amor salvaje' ('A Year of Wild Love') was made by Alberto Saiz and Víctor Ortega

Director Alberto Saiz and cameraman Víctor Ortega will share anecdotes of the making of this documentary, including the challenges and difficulties they encountered when filming wildlife.

It is a unique documentary about the courtship behaviour of some of the most fascinating animals in Europe over the course of a year, made with Fujifilm equipment to capture those unique moments in nature.

This film will be screened on Sunday 23 February, from 13.30 to 14.30.

13.40-14.30. 'Panama: photographing the birds of the Cloud Forest' by Ignacio Yúfera

Panama's cloud forest is home to special birds such as the Resplendent Quetzal and a wide variety of mountain hummingbirds. Photographing them in their environment allows for unique images, while also presenting very interesting challenges in terms of light and weather conditions.

Ignacio Yúfera is a Spanish photographer based in Panama since 2015, founder and CEO of Tamandúa Nature Tours and owner of the Tamandúa Reserve, in the western highlands of Panama. He is author of the book 'Birds of Morocco'.

16.30-17.15. 'Photography as a tool for conservation and science' by Javier Aznar

Javier Aznar will share his experiences about photography and his work to link it with nature conservation.

A trained biologist, he has been a full-time photographer for ten years, focusing mainly on nature and conservation. He is a member of the International League of Conservation Photographers (ILCP) and The Photo Society, both based in the United States. He frequently publishes in international magazines, such as 'National Geographic', on topics related to nature and some of the smallest and most forgotten animals.

An incredible journey in search of the most emblematic species of the Arctic Circle. A unique itinerary that goes from the enchanting forests of the Finnish taiga to the rugged coasts of the Varanger Peninsula and the Barents Sea, where the goal is none other than reaching one of the wildest places in the world: the frozen archipelago, the Svalbard Islands.

Forestry engineer, nature guide, birdwatcher and wildlife photographer, Merce R. Romero from Extremadura likes to define herself as a born conservationist. She entered the world of photography at a very early age. She has been running photographic tours through different countries around the world for more than ten years, in search of the most emblematic species on our planet.



11.30-11.50. 'Night photography of wildlife. The help provided by the Canon R system' by Mario Cea

Wildlife photography is even more challenging when done at night. Many animals are nocturnal, so it is therefore necessary to use techniques and accessories to capture them in their habitat. The Canon R system offers tools that facilitate this type of photography, allowing better results to be obtained more easily.

12.00-12.20. 'Photography, result or process, why not both?' by Tito García

Photography is often the result of a series of concerns. It is the desire to make time stop, probably the only way to do so, and, often, with the intention of sharing that moment. The





process can take a long time, sometimes a lifetime dreaming of a scene, and this journey full of emotions, illusions and expectations cannot be cut short by not being prepared. Photography is, without a doubt, the result of a process.

12.30-12.50. 'Birds of Europe. The quest to create the ultimate photo identification guide' by Marc Guyt

Marc Guyt will talk about the photographic challenges of the seven years (plus two years of translation) it took to complete the 'Id Handbook of European Birds' (published by Lynx as 'Aves de Europa').

He is the founder and director of Agami Photo Agency, a Netherlands-based photo agency specialising in bird and nature images.

13.00-13.20. 'Portfolio 1: Photography and stories of extraordinary birds' by Rafael Armada and Alejandra Rendón

'Portfolio 1: Photographs and stories of extraordinary birds' is a work that combines striking images by bird photographer Rafael Armada with narratives by Alejandra Rendón, creating stories that intertwine personal experiences, science and conservation. This book is a journey into nature and an invitation to admire the simple, the natural and to see the extraordinary in each of the species that inhabit our planet.

13.30-14.30. Screening of the documentary 'Un año de amor salvaje' ('A year of wild love') by Alberto Saiz

In the natural world, the drive that sustains life is courtship and reproduction. Throughout the four seasons in the northern hemisphere, we will witness fascinating behaviours in different animals, all with a common purpose: to continue their legacy for another year.

Alberto Saiz, director of 'Un año de amor salvaje' ('A year of wild love'), will give a presentation, followed by a screening of his documentary.

The overall winner of the FIO 2025 competition, chosen from among the winners of the C1, C2, C3 and C4 categories, will be announced on February 22 at an event starting at 6:00 p.m, presented by Roberto Brasero, head of the Meteorology department of Antena 3.

The total value of prize money has increased from 6,800 to 7,300 euros.

The jury was made up of nature photographers Adriana Sanz (Argentina), José María Benítez Cidoncha, Laura Núñez, Mario Suárez Porras, Pablo Bou Mira and Ricardo Lourenço (Portugal).

The best 50 photographs (winners, honourable mentions and finalists) can be seen at FIO in a high-quality exhibition, sponsored by Fujifilm Spain, and are part of a catalogue published by the General Directorate of Tourism.

The British illustrator, Ian Lewington, designer of the 2025 poster



The poster for the 20th FIO features the White-rumped Swift (*Apus caffer*), a migratory species that symbolises the connection between continents. This bird, which can be seen in Extremadura from May to October, migrates to the tropical areas of sub-Saharan Africa after the breeding season.

The image for FIO 2025 is the work of British artist Ian Lewington, one of the most influential artists in the field of ornithology. He is renowned for his ability to fuse scientific precision with a captivating artistic style, as he has demonstrated in multiple prestigious guides, such as 'Rare Birds of North America', produced with Steve N. G. Howell and Will Russell.

For ten years, he has been working on a guide to North American birds that will be published by Princeton University Press in 2026.

The Regional Government of Extremadura, as in previous FIOs, has invited a highly prestigious artist to make an original and exclusive illustration.

To mark the 20th anniversary, a new commemorative logo has also been designed and the aesthetics of the fair's graphic elements have been updated, while a visual identity manual has been drawn up to ensure consistency throughout all communication.
